Grand Bank, Newfoundland and Labrador, Canada or 'Grand Banc' as the first French settlers pronounced it, is a small rural town with a population of 2,580. It is located on the southern tip or "toe" of the Burin Peninsula (also known as "the boot"), 360 km from the province's capital of St. John's. Grand Bank was inhabited by French fisherman as early as 1640 and started as a fishing settlement with about seven families. It was given the name "Grand Banc" because of the high bank that extends from *Abies grandis* (grand fir, giant fir, lowland white fir, great silver fir, western white fir, Vancouver fir, or Oregon fir) is a fir native to the Pacific Northwest and Northern California of North America, occurring at altitudes of sea level to 1,800 m. It is a major constituent of the Grand Fir/Douglas Fir Ecoregion of the Cascade Range. The tree typically grows to 40–70 m (131-229 ft.) in height, and may be the tallest *Abies* species in the world. There are two varieties, the taller coast grand fir Grand Fir The Pine Family—Pinaceae. *Abies grandis* (Douglas ex D. Don) Lindl. (Ay-beez GRAN-dis). Names: Grand Fir is also sometimes called Lowland Fir because it is the only fir in our area commonly found in lower elevations. Relationships: There are about 40 species of true firs in the world, 9 in North America. We have 4 in our region but only the Grand Fir, *Abies grandis*, is common in lower elevations.
