Songs of Innocence was first published by Blake in 1789. Songs of Experience came later. Blake combined them into one volume called Songs of Innocence and of Experience in 1794. Songs of Innocence follows the 18th century tradition of illustrated children's books. Songs of Experience has a darker edge. In 1789, when songs of Innocence was published, the early stages of the French Revolution offered hope for a progressive future.
