

# Anarchist Voices: An Oral History of Anarchism in America; 9780691044941; 1996; 323 pages; Princeton University Press, 1996; Paul Avrich

Introduction: Anarchism in Latin America by Romina Akemi & Javier Sethness-Castro. After authoring dozens of books on classical Greek and anarchist philosophy, Ángel Cappelletti dedicated his last monograph to a forgotten history of anarchism in the region. The publication of *Anarchism in Latin America (El Anarquismo en América Latina)* in 1990 coincided with important historical impasses such as the fall of the Soviet Union and the aggressive spread of neoliberalism. These events roused disillusionment about whether socialism was even still a viable option while, at the same time, frustration.
