As a result, it is easier to read out loud than the same passages from the KJV Bible. The majority of the entries are from the Old Testament, and some of them I wasnâ€™t familiar with. I like the lengthy Table of Contents, which gives a title to each story, the Bible reference, and the page number where it is located. New King James Version. The NKJV translation project was conceived by Arthur Farstad. It was inaugurated in 1975 with two meetings (Nashville and Chicago) of 130 biblical scholars, pastors, and theologians. The men who were invited prepared the guidelines for the NKJV. The aim of its translators was to update the vocabulary and grammar of the King James Version, while preserving the classic style and literary beauty of the original 1769 edition of the King James Version. The 130 translators believed in faithfulness to the original Greek, Aramaic, and Hebrew texts including the Dead Sea Scrolls
